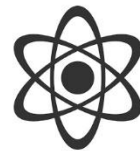

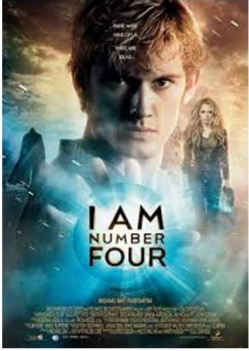

Let it Snow

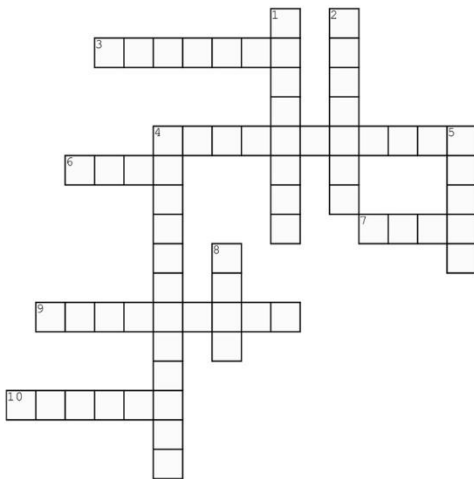

A: Friends are tricky and they can be the best at times and the worst at times, but a true friend will always stick up for you. Sometimes you have to give them space and hope for the best.

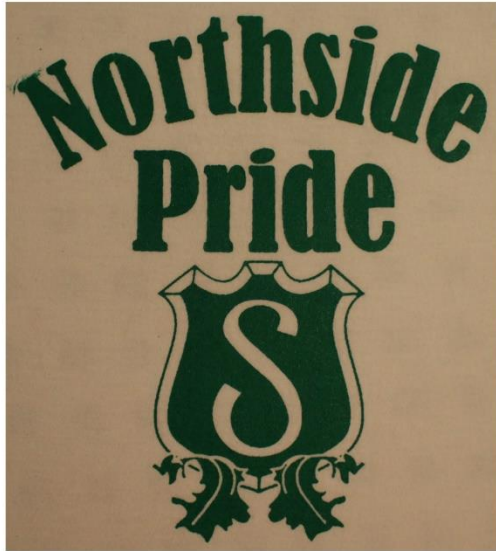
How is TAP beneficial to students?

Have you ever wondered if TAP is necessary or why it was started in the first place? Our staff and scholars all have different opinions on TAP. Our principal, Mrs. Koyama, said that she wished that students did not have TAP and would come to school on time. TAP was started because there would be a long line and students would have to wait for a tardy pass. TAP was started over 10 years ago by the former principal, Ms. Veltsy. Sixth grader, Rachel Lucero, gave us her opinion on TAP and she doesn't think that TAP is necessary because "you can't do anything unless you have homework." We also interviewed 7th grader Enola-Lee Guyer, who has a different opinion of TAP. She said, "TAP gives me and others the motivation to not be late." She also believes that the only thing wrong with TAP is that it seems unnecessary to get pulled out of 8th period early because you were late a few minutes. 8th grader, Gabe Alba, believes TAP is helpful to him and others. Gabe also says, "TAP helps students get their work done and it also helps students learn to not be late." Mrs. Reyes, who runs TAP said there were 19 students in TAP when she first started and that, "the number of students in TAP has gone down since then."

As we looked at TAP and its reasoning, we also looked for an alternative. Mr. Alba thinks that a good alternative would be to clean classrooms after school. Another idea that came up was having scholars have mandatory tutoring after school. The way this system would work is to have tutoring for the same amount of time as TAP. If the scholar is late by less than one minute, they could choose which subject to work on, but if they are later than one minute, their teachers could decide what they have to work on. We believe this system would work because it will still encourage scholars to not be late, but if they are late they can get help with their school work.
